<b>Purpose and Scope</b>
<p>This standard audit program assists the auditor in planning and performing the compliance audit of cost accounting practices submitted in a Disclosure Statement amendment to support the Cognizant Federal Agency Official's (CFAO) determination of revised/new cost accounting practices (including corrections of noncompliance) compliance with applicable CAS and FAR Part 31, as required by FAR 30.604(b) or FAR 30.605(c)(2). The scope of the Disclosure Statement compliance audit is to compare the disclosed cost accounting practices to the applicable CAS (including CAS 4xx-40 Fundamental requirements and 4xx-50 Techniques for application) and FAR Part 31 regulations to determine whether the described cost accounting practices comply with the standards and regulations. The audit program does not include testing actual practices for compliance with CAS and FAR Part 31, because we perform those tests in conjunction with routine audits (i.e., forward pricing, incurred costs, CAS compliance audits, etc.).</p>
<p>The adequacy assessment of the revised Disclosure Statement (activity code 19190) should be conducted prior to accepting the compliance engagement and documented by completing applicable portions of the adequacy checklist B-04 Conformity of RDS Disclosure Statement with General Instructions and B-05 Internal Consistency of Disclosed Practices in a RDS Disclosure Statement.</p> <p>If any inadequacies were identified in the 19190 adequacy assessment, ensure the 11D Inadequacy Notification Memorandum was sent to the CFAO. Coordinate with the CFAO and provide him/her with enough information to resolve any inadequacies in the descriptions in the revised Disclosure Statement before a compliance audit is requested. A separate DCAA adequacy notification memorandum to the CFAO will not be issued as adequacy is implied upon acceptance of any audit engagement.</p> <p>If the audit team concludes the cost accounting practice change(s) are adequately described and the CFAO affirms the disclosure statement will be determined adequate, the audit team may</p>

accept the engagement and begin the audit of the revised/new cost accounting practice descriptions for compliance. DCAA should not accept the compliance engagement when the revised/new cost accounting practice description is inadequate.
NOTE: This program does not replace individual auditor judgment and therefore, must be tailored to reflect a mutual understanding between the audit team as to the scope required to meet auditing standards and objectives for this specific assignment.

<b>Definitions</b>
<b><i>Allocation of cost to cost objectives:</i></b> As defined in 48 CFR 9903.302-1(c), “includes both direct and indirect allocation of cost. Examples of cost accounting practices involving allocation of cost to cost objectives are the accounting methods or techniques used to accumulate cost, to determine whether a cost is to be directly or indirectly allocated to determine the composition of cost pools, and to determine the selection and composition of the appropriate allocation base.”
<b><i>Assignment of cost to cost accounting periods:</i></b> As defined in 48 CFR 9903.302-1(b), “refers to a method or technique used in determining the amount of cost to be assigned to individual cost accounting periods. Examples of cost accounting practices which involve the assignment of cost to cost accounting periods are requirements for the use of specified accrual basis accounting or cash basis accounting for a cost element.”
<b><i>Cost accounting practice:</i></b> As defined in 48 CFR 9903.302-1, “means any disclosed or established accounting method or technique which is used for allocation of cost to cost objectives, assignment of cost to cost accounting periods, or measurement of cost.”
<b><i>Cost accounting practice change:</i></b> As defined in <a href="#">48 CFR 9903.302-2</a> , means any alteration in a cost accounting practice method or technique which is used to measure cost, assign cost to cost

accounting periods, or allocate cost to cost objectives, as defined in <a href="#">48 CFR 9903.302-1</a> , whether or not such cost accounting practices are covered by a Disclosure Statement. The definition specifies that the initial adoption of a cost accounting practice, the partial or total elimination of a cost, and the revision of a previously immaterial cost accounting practice are not cost accounting practice changes.
<p><b>Measurement of cost:</b> As defined in 48 CFR 9903.302-1(a), encompasses accounting methods and techniques used in defining the components of cost, determining the basis for cost measurement, and establishing criteria for use of alternative cost measurement techniques. The determination of the amount paid or a change in the amount paid for a unit of goods and services is not a cost accounting practice. Examples of cost accounting practices which involve measurement of costs are -</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(1) The use of either historical cost, market value, or present value;</li> <li>(2) The use of standard cost or actual cost; or</li> <li>(3) The designation of those items of cost which must be included or excluded from tangible capital assets or pension cost.”</li> </ul>

1. Document that the contractor is still performing CAS-covered contracts/subcontracts that require maintenance of a Disclosure Statement.	
2. Coordinate with the contractor to provide a walkthrough of the Disclosure Statement revisions to gain an understanding of the described cost accounting practice methods or techniques, the reason why the revisions were made (cost accounting practice (CAP) change or correction of a noncompliance) and obtain other information needed to complete the risk assessment. Ask the contractor if they plan to change any current cost accounting practices, and if so, is the changed cost accounting practice described. The changed cost accounting practice should be described as well as the existing cost accounting practice for the disclosure statement to be considered adequate (CAM 8-204a.(1)(b)). Whenever possible, the CFAO should attend the contractor’s walk-through of the disclosed cost accounting practices.	
3. Obtain and document an understanding of contractor internal controls relevant to the audit. Auditors may obtain a significant portion of this understanding during the walkthrough.	
4. Document the audit team’s conclusion about the adequacy of the part(s) of the disclosure statement requested for audit and the reason for the revision. Prior to accepting the revised Disclosure Statement compliance audit engagement, we need to discuss the reason for the revised/new cost accounting practice(s) and the adequacy of the description with the CFAO.

The auditor and the CFAO should agree on the adequacy of the changed cost accounting practice(s) description. DCAA should not perform a compliance audit on an inadequately described revised/new cost accounting practice.	
5. Review the audit request to determine the nature and objective of the audit. Ideally the CFAO's audit request would include a statement about the adequacy of the Revised Disclosure Statement and specify the specific Part(s) and Item Nos. Note any specific information requested and special requirements. Coordinate a post walkthrough meeting with the CFAO to discuss the revised/new cost accounting practices which are not significant (i.e., clarifications) and those that are significant (i.e., change in cost accounting practice) and the risks associated with each. This meeting should result in a clarification of the audit request and discuss any specific concerns or special requirements the CFAO may have. Adjust the audit scope and procedures accordingly.	
6. Notify the appropriate CFAO of the commencement of the risk assessment and that the expected completion date will be provided in the formal acknowledgement once the risk assessment is complete. The acknowledgement process should be performed in accordance with CAM 4-104.	
7. If necessary, coordinate with the Home Office(s) auditors to determine the status of the audit of Part VIII, and Part V, VI, and/or VII (if the Home Office either establishes practices or procedures for the types of costs covered by these parts or incurs costs and then allocates these types of costs to its segments). If part of a CAD network, discuss exceptions that have been identified by other offices to consider as part of this audit. Request assist audit(s), if needed.	
8. Analyze and classify the revised/new cost accounting practices subject to audit.	
a. If applicable, document the contractor's notification of cost accounting practice changes, or corrections of noncompliant practices, submitted with the Disclosure Statement revisions (required by FAR 52.230-6(b)).

<p>b. Compare the revised cost accounting practice description to the prior cost accounting practice description to determine and document the reason for the revised/new item(s) of the submission:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• correction of noncompliance,</li> <li>• implementation of a particular cost accounting practice change (unilateral, desirable, or required),</li> <li>• initial adoption of cost accounting practice for a new cost or function,</li> <li>• partial or total elimination of a cost accounting practice because the cost or function is eliminated, and/or</li> <li>• administrative revision that only alters the description of, but does not reflect any alteration to, the contractor's cost accounting practice. <i>(Note: As part of the coordination with the CFAO no administrative change should be sent for audit.)</i></li> </ul> <p><i>Note: Organizational changes by themselves are not changes to cost accounting practices. However carefully evaluate organizational changes which result in a change in the method or technique the contractor uses to measure costs, assign costs to cost accounting periods, or allocate costs to cost objectives to determine if changes to cost accounting practices occurred. (CAM 8-303.3.d).</i></p>	
<p>c. Assess the materiality (quantitative and qualitative) of the cost accounting practice(s) subject to audit. If applicable, compare the previous forward pricing rate proposal to the forward pricing rate proposal with the revised/new cost accounting practice.</p> <p><i>Note: CAS-covered contracts include both flexibly priced and fixed price contracts and subcontracts</i></p>	
<p>d. Identify the applicable cost accounting standards and FAR Part 31 regulations that will be used to evaluate the compliance of the revised/new cost accounting practice descriptions.</p> <p><i>Note: The CAS-FAR-DS Cross Reference Table, found on the DCAA Intranet Portal under Useful Audit Links, identifies the Disclosure Statement sections that correspond to the CAS standard and FAR Part 31.</i></p>

<p>e. Prepare a list of CAS applicability dates for each standard used to evaluate the compliance of the contractor's disclosed cost accounting practices (CAM 8-301.c.).</p> <p><i>Note: The applicability date marks the beginning of the period when the contractor's accounting and reporting systems must comply with a new or revised standard. Most standards are applicable at the beginning of the next fiscal year after receipt of a contractor's first CAS-covered contract. CAS 418 and 420 are applicable at the beginning of the second fiscal year, and CAS 401, 402, 405, and 414 are applicable immediately. Use the list to determine how to best report a CAS noncompliance.</i></p>	
<p>9. Review the perm file, EPIC for audit leads, and prior/in-process audits, for significant and relevant risk factors such as, but not limited to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Prior CFAO determinations of compliance.</li> <li>• Audit leads related to the subject matter.</li> <li>• Prior audit tests of compliance and audit findings.</li> <li>• Outstanding CAS and FAR noncompliance(s).</li> </ul> <p>Evaluate the impact on the scope of this audit and adjust accordingly.</p>	
<p>10. Review permanent file to determine if previous audits included findings and recommendations that impact the subject matter. If there were findings material to the subject matter, document this information in the risk assessment and follow-up with contractor management during the entrance conference.</p>	
<p>11. Review permanent file to determine if the contractor has previously provided other studies or audits (e.g., summary listing of internal audits or external audit reports) that directly relate to the subject matter. If there are no other studies or audits, document that information in the working papers and perform the procedures below.</p> <p>a. Ask contractor management if internal audits were performed. If yes, request contractor provide a summary listing of the internal audits that would assist us in understanding and evaluating the efficacy of the internal controls relevant to the subject matter of the audit.</p> <p>b. If the review of the perm file or the contractor identifies relevant internal audits:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Determine if access to these reports is necessary to complete the evaluation of the relevant internal controls to support the risk assessment or audit procedures related to the subject matter of the audit. There must be a nexus between the internal audit reports and the scope of this specific assignment.</li> </ul>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If assignment is at a major contractor location, coordinate with the CAD or FAO point of contact (POC) for internal audit reports to request the contractor provide access to the reports.</li> <li>• If assignment is at a non-major contractor and the FAO does not have a designated POC, the auditor should request the contractor provide access to the internal audit reports.</li> <li>• The request should include information on how the internal audit report is relevant to the DCAA audit. Place a copy of the request in the assignment administrative working papers.</li> </ul> <p>c. If the review of the perm file or the contractor identifies relevant other audits or studies:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Obtain publicly available information for the relevant other Government agency audits (e.g., websites for DoD IG or other IGs, service audit agencies, etc.).</li> <li>• Make appropriate adjustments to your risk assessment and planned procedures based on the reported findings.</li> </ul> <p>d. Document the results of the inquiries including the response received from the contractor for any request for access to internal audit reports. (If access was not granted this should include the contractor's rationale or justification for not granting access).</p> <p>e. Determine if additional audit procedures are needed to respond to identified risk.</p>	
<p>12. Ascertain whether the revision(s) will affect any outstanding noncompliance issues or any other current audit assignments, such as a price proposal. If so, notify other teams with ongoing audits at this contractor of the cost accounting practice change and inform them that they should consider its impact on their audit(s).</p>	
<p>13. Management Inquiries</p> <p>During the entrance conference or other appropriate meeting make the GAGAS required inquiries of contractor management. Using the framework of WP B-06, document the contractor's response, and identify areas of risk and the impact to the audit scope.</p>	B-06
<p>14. Fraud Risk Indicators</p> <p>Using the framework in WP B-09, discuss the fraud risk indicators with the audit team.</p>	B-09

<p>15. Review and discuss with your supervisor (or if appropriate, the audit team) the overall results of the risk assessment and reach an agreement on the:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. planned audit scope, including the detailed audit steps (-01 working papers) to be performed,</li> <li>b. timeframe for completing the audit including the proposed delivery date, which will be discussed with the requester and mutually agreed-to, and</li> <li>c. zero-based budget.</li> <li>d. Make any further adjustment to the audit program steps necessary to obtain sufficient evidence to provide a reasonable basis for the conclusion that will be expressed in the audit report.</li> </ul>	
<p>16. Obtain and document supervisory approval of the risk assessment and the planned scope of examination in working paper B and -1 audit programs.</p>	
<p>17. Conduct an entrance conference. Confirm the team's understanding of the cost accounting practices being audited and supporting data. Discuss the availability of required data and personnel necessary to timely support the audit. If applicable, include a follow up with contractor management on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Ask contractor management if corrective actions were taken to address previous DCAA findings and recommendations reported in DCAA audits (e.g., questioned costs, business system deficiencies, CAS audits) that are relevant to the subject matter of audit. If yes, have contractor explain corrective actions taken and determine if additional audit procedures should be included in the fieldwork to test the corrective actions. (GAGAS 7.13)</li> <li>b. Document the results of the inquiry and the impact of the corrective actions to the subject matter.</li> <li>c. Other studies or audits that impact the subject matter.</li> </ul>	
<p>18. Issue a notification letter to the contractor regarding the audit in accordance with CAM 4-302.3.</p>	
<p>19. Issue a final acknowledgment memorandum to the CFAO to communicate our audit scope and the agreed-to due date.</p>	
<p>20. Update the information in the permanent files as needed.</p>

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1. Compare the disclosed cost accounting practice description to the relevant CAS 4xx-40 Fundamental requirements, CAS 4xx-50 Techniques for application and FAR Part 31 regulations and document whether the practice complies with the standard and regulation. Limit the scope for the audit to compliance of disclosed practices with the applicable CAS standard and FAR Part 31 cost principle. Compliance of actual practices is tested in other routine audits (i.e., forward pricing, incurred costs, CAS compliance audits, etc.). Document findings and conclusions in sufficient detail to enable an experienced auditor to understand the extent and results of the procedures performed to determine if the disclosed cost accounting practices are compliant with CAS and FAR Part 31 (GAGAS 7.34).

2. Obtain and incorporate results of assist audit(s), if requested.	
3. Coordinate significant or unusual issues with the supervisor and, if applicable, the technical specialist.	
4. If part of a CAD or home office network, obtain feedback on similar audit issues within the network.	
5. If a CAS 4xx-40, 4xx-50 and/or FAR Part 31 noncompliance is identified:	
a. Document the auditor's discussion with the CFAO regarding the CAS/FAR noncompliance in accordance with CAM 4-105 and 8-302.4.	
b. Draft the Condition (condition, criteria, and effect) and Recommendation of the SOCAR (CAM 10-211.2c).	
i. Contractors may fail to comply with a CAS requirement, FAR regulation, or its own disclosed/established practice.</i>

<p>implemented corrective action to correct the noncompliance, does the CFAO consider the action sufficient to reduce the future potential impact to the Government.</p> <p><i>Note: Accumulating and disclosed practice noncompliance exist from the time the noncompliance started to the time the noncompliance was corrected. Estimating noncompliance exist for the entire period of performance.</i></p>	
<p>iii. Document the significance (CAM 8-302.7) and/or rough order of magnitude (ROM) of the materiality if possible (48 CFR Part 9903.305 Materiality). While the cost impact is the contractor's responsibility, clearly communicating the effect on CAS-covered (flexibly priced and fixed price) contracts/subcontracts increases the persuasiveness of the SOCAR and the need for the CFAO to require the contractor to take corrective action.</p>	
<p>6. After management review and approval, send the draft SOCAR to the contractor and request a formal written response. (CAM 4-304.6(b) transmittal letter)</p>

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<p>1. If applicable, review the contractor's reaction to the SOCAR(s). Meet with the contractor to discuss and ensure the audit team fully understands the contractor's response. Document all interim discussions in the working papers. Invite the CFAO to meetings with the contractor whenever possible and keep them informed throughout the assignment.</p>	
<p>2. Summarize and document the results of audit. If applicable, incorporate results of assist audit request.</p>	
<p>3. Discuss results with the supervisor and, if applicable, the technical specialist.</p>	
<p>4. Prepare the draft audit report. Modify the subject matter stated in the Report On (from WP A-01) and Opinion (from WP A) sections of the audit report, as necessary, to clearly identify the specific Disclosure Statement Item Number(s) audited.</p>	
<p>5. Obtain supervisory/management review of the working papers and draft audit results section of the audit report before discussion with the contractor. Hold an exit conference with the contractor and provide the draft audit report to the contractor for comments in accordance with CAM 4-304.</p>

6. Brief the CFAO on significant and/or complex findings/issues and document the communications in the working papers.	
7. Finalize the audit report by incorporating the exit conference details, contractor's reaction and auditor's response, if applicable.	
8. Complete the administrative working papers.	
9. Complete the following steps: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Prepare audit lead workflows, as applicable.</li><li>• Update the contractor permanent file, as appropriate.</li></ul>	
10. Submit the working paper package and draft report to the supervisor/manager for final review and processing.	
11. If a material weakness or significant internal control deficiency is detected during this audit, ensure that the findings have been fully developed to determine if a material weakness in compliance with the DFARS 252.242-7006 Accounting System, DFARS 252.215-7002 Estimating System, or DFARS 252.242-7004 Material Management and Accounting System criteria exists. If so, open a Business System Deficiency assignment (Activity Code 11090) to report the deficiency and submit it to the contractor for comment.
